

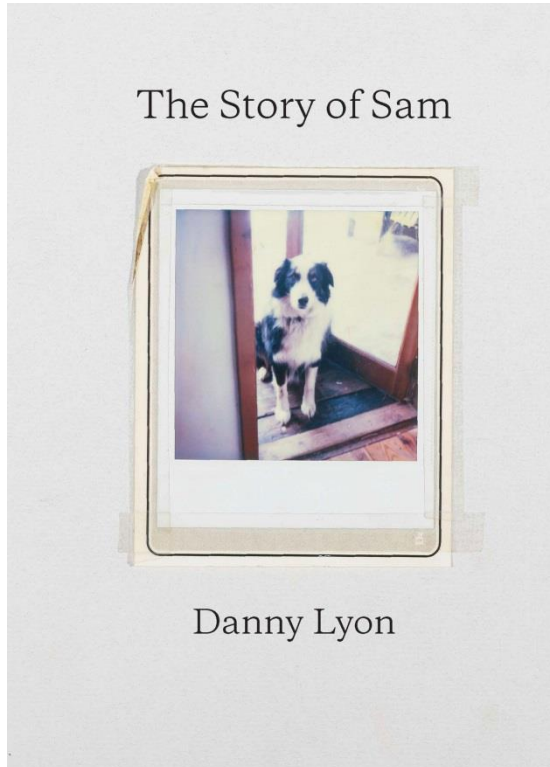

DANNY LYON BOOK LAUNCH: A READING AND RECEPTION

Thursday September 8, 2016 at 7:00 pm

In conjunction with its current exhibition *Danny Lyon: Message to the Future*, the Whitney Museum of American Art will present a reading and Q+A with artist Danny Lyon to celebrate the release of his two new books, *The Story of Sam* and *Burn Zone*, from 7:00 pm to 9:00 pm on Thursday, September 8 in the Whitney Shop.

The Story of Sam includes original photos by Lyon and tells the story of an Australian Shepard named Sam who writes a screenplay. *Burn Zone* offers a passionate polemic on climate change.

Following the reading, Lyon will sign copies of *The Story of Sam*, *Burn Zone*, and the exhibition catalogue *Danny Lyon: Message to the Future*. All of these books are available for pre-order or purchase in the Whitney Shop.
